The Society of St Vincent de Paul (SVP) was established in Ireland in 1844. It is the largest voluntary charitable organisation in Ireland. Our focus is on a practical approach to dealing with poverty, alleviating its effects on individuals and families through working primarily in person-to-person contact by a unique system of Home Visitation and seeking to achieve social justice and equality of opportunity for all citizens.

The Society promotes community self-sufficiency, enabling people to help themselves. Any assistance offered by the Society is given in a nonjudgemental spirit, based on the needs of the individual or family seeking help.

The Society respects the dignity of those who contact us, offering assistance and advice when sought, maintaining their dignity while assisting them towards long-term self-sufficiency in a relationship of friendship, trust and confidentiality.

Our Mission and Ethos

SVP is a Christian voluntary organisation, working with people experiencing poverty and disadvantage. We are involved in a diverse range of activities characterised by:

Support and friendship

Through person-to-person contact, we are committed to respecting the dignity of those we assist and fostering self-respect. We assure confidentiality at all times and endeavour to establish relationships based on trust and friendship.

Promoting self-sufficiency

It is not enough to promote short-term material support. Those we assist are also helped to achieve self-sufficiency in the longer term and the sense of self-worth this provides. When problems are beyond our competence we enlist the support of specialised help.

Working for Social Justice

We are committed to identifying the root cause of poverty and social exclusion and, in solidarity with the disadvantaged and those living in poverty, to advocate and work for the changes required to create a more just and caring society.

Spiritual Reflection by Fr Perry Gildea C.M.

Ubi Caritas Est Ibi Deus Est – Where There is Love There Also is God

In the first week of this year, we buried Pope Benedict XVI 10 years after he startled the world by resigning as Pope. The papers were quick to review his life and mention his reputation as a conservative theologian. As Pope, he revealed a somewhat different aspect of his theology and spirituality. His wonderful encyclical letters on Love (charity) and Hope were both positive and comforting.

In Deus Caritas Est (God is Love) he closely echoes the sentiments of both St Vincent and Ozanam who frequently insisted we should see the face of Christ in the poor. "Love of the neighbour...consists in the very fact that, in God and with God, I can love even the person whom I do not like or even know. On the basis of an intimate encounter with God...I learn to look on this other person not simply with my eyes and feelings but from the perspective of Jesus Christ. His friend is my friend" (DC 18). This is a serious reminder that love and faith are at the heart of the work and life of all Vincentians. Pope Benedict makes a rather startling criticism of merely pious spirituality. "If in my life I fail completely to heed others out of a desire to be 'devout' and to perform my 'religious duties' then my relationship with God will also grow arid. It becomes merely 'proper', but loveless" (DC 18).

Love of God and service of the neighbour are mutually supportive. "If I have no contact whatsoever with God in my life, then I cannot see in the other anything more than the other, and I am incapable of seeing in them the image of God." The loving service of the neighbour becomes also our pathway to a deeper relationship with our heavenly Father. Our readiness to encounter our neighbour and show them love makes us sensitive to God's love for us as well. "Only if I serve my neighbour (with love) can my eyes be opened to what God does for me and how much he loves me" (DC 18).

The Eucharist might be called the school of love. It is there we encounter the greatest gift of God's love for humanity. The willing sacrifice of Christ for the salvation of the world, the loving laying down of his life. "God so loved the world that he sent his only Son" (Jn 3:16). Here, we can remember a repeated thought of Benedict - "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction" (DC 1). This encounter is renewed with each loving visit to those in need and the loving answer to that need, just as truly as it is renewed in our sacramental encounter with God's love in the Eucharist. Each needs the other. "Where there is love, there is God."

In these difficult times of 2023, the work of the Society is recognised and appreciated by many and this is important, not as a public relations exercise but as a witness to the charitable nature of the Church and Christianity. "Love of the neighbour, grounded in the love of God is a responsibility of the entire ecclesial community," and this love requires organisation. This would have pleased both St Vincent and Blessed Frédéric as they insisted on aid being organised and were among the most successful organisers in the history of both charity and the Church. "As a community, the Church must practice love. Love needs to be organised if it is to be a service to the whole community". "Within the community of believers there can never be room for a poverty that denies anyone what is needed for a dignified life" (DC 20). Thus, the spirituality of the Society is both personal and a spirituality which also contributes to the mission of the Church.

His prophetic social vision appears in his teaching and every aspect of his short life. We thank you Lord, for these many gifts and we ask, the grace of a miracle through his intercession that the Church may proclaim his holiness, as a saint, and an inspirational model of charity for our world.

We make this prayer through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Mary Waide, SVP Regional President for the North Region, attended the Maundy Thursday Service at St George's Chapel Windsor.

Speaking about her invitation, Mary said: "I was thrilled to receive an invitation to the Maundy Thursday Service at St George's Chapel Windsor Castle and was even more delighted when I was informed that I had been nominated to attend the service by The Most Reverend Noel Treanor, Bishop of Down and Connor, as Church of Ireland Bishop of Connor, the Rt Rev George Davison, had very generously shared one of his two places with our Diocese.

"It was a great honour to be able to represent St Vincent de Paul and be recognised for our work by HRH Prince Charles. He presented me with the Maundy Purses and, when shaking my hand, advised me that the specially minted coins were being presented to me on behalf of Her Majesty The Queen as a thank you for our work. One of only 96 women and 96 men to have been invited to the service, marking her 96th birthday, I was in awe as I witnessed the pomp and ceremony while watching the procession of clergy and Royal representatives take place right in front of me. I think I had one of the best seats in the chape!! "The organ music was beautiful and the choir singing in the magnificent St George's Chapel was just breathtaking. The Role of An Area President

What is the Purpose of an Area President?

An Area President provides support and guidance to the Regional President and Conferences in quality Home Visitation and all other activities, in accordance with the ethos and vision of the Society. An Area President is part of the Regional Council which is the decision making body of the Region.

An Area President should be:

- A member of a Conference for a minimum of two years
- Willing to step down from officer role of own Conference
- Willing to visit Conferences regularly

- An Area President should:
- Embrace and promote the ethos of the Society
- Have good leadership skills
- Have good communication skills

What are the key tasks and responsibilities of an Area President?

- To be active by attending monthly Regional Council meetings
- To regularly visit Conferences in the Area for which you are responsible
- To record and hold Area Council meetings minimum six times per year
- Appoint officers to an Area Board in accordance with 'The Rule' to assist the Area President
- To develop good working relationships with the Region's Member Support Officer (MSO)
- To set up new Conferences where a need is identified within the Area
- To ensure Conferences comply with 'The Rule'
- To ensure compliance with legal requirements and SVP policies and procedures, including SVP Safeguarding Policy and Procedures
- To ensure visits happen in pairs (preferably mixed pairs)
- To ensure there is two-way communication between Regional Council and Conferences
- To identify a successor for Area President in an appropriate timeframe
- To ensure finance is managed at Area and local level including fund sharing.

SVP was receiving in excess of 2,000 requests for help a week in towns, cities and villages across the country and the Appeal, entitled "Impossible Choices", aimed to help meet basic family needs of

the thousands who were clearly struggling, despite the promises of additional cost of living support payments being made by the government.

Launching the Appeal, Mary Waide, SVP Regional President for the North Region, said: "Last year was sadly recordbreaking with 191,000 requests for help received at our national and regional offices. Unfortunately that figure looks likely to be exceeded this year with 168,000 requests already received across the island to the end of October, a 19% increase on the same time in 2021.

"We are very worried that many families will continue to struggle into next year. In the coming months the cost of living crisis will hit different households in different ways, particularly with the rising costs of food, energy and housing. Add in the cost of celebrating Christmas and you can see how difficult life is going to be for those on fixed incomes, whether that income comes from government benefits or from low-paid employment.

"Those hardest hit will include one parent-families, low income workers, low-income households in rural areas, the unemployed, those who are retired or people living with disabilities and their carers. The most vulnerable in our communities are all facing impossible choices this Christmas which will undoubtedly stretch into the new year. That is why we are seeking donations to help families pay for food to put on the table, heat their homes and ensure their children enjoy the magic of Christmas.

"We are appealing to people to please donate whatever they can spare to help SVP give the gift of choice this Christmas."

The Difference SVP Makes

Just a note to say I've been a recipient of your services in Ballymena. On the first occasion, it was Rosemary and Henry who visited. They both kept in touch and last Christmas it was Rosemary. Reaching out in the first place was really hard for me but Rosemary and Henry couldn't have been less judgemental and more kind and, to be honest, that kind of understanding is as helpful and needed as much as anything else. It's a lovely thing to know there are such kind volunteers taking their time out to help people.

Thank you.

Hello there, I would just like to thank everyone who helped me and my son today. Tonight we had a nice meal from the food hamper. Thank you for the box of biscuits that was a real treat - felt like Christmas time. We have gas and electric and we are thankful for the toiletry items. Recent poverty has hit us both hard from domestic violence, fleeing to Women's Aid refuge and finally being rehomed. We have both had to start from scratch and walked away on the night in question with the clothes on our back and four small bags. It's hard and lonely having to do the new house up from scratch and on my own with no help. We may have concrete floors and no blinds but we have a roof over our head. We will get there one day at a time but at least we have food for the next week and gas and electric. Your work is invaluable thank you so much from my 13 year old son and 1.

I am back to say a word of appreciation on behalf of my family and myself, one of the volunteers called me yesterday 12/04/2022 to announce to me the gifts authorised for us, I got the vouchers today 13/04/2022. Six gift vouchers of £10 each for electricity and gas plus one gift voucher of £20 for groceries. Total was £80 worth of gift vouchers, trust me sir this was a breakthrough, I ask God to bless you and the entire team, I am deeply grateful God bless you.

Hello, I just wanted to thank you for your help, you have all been so good to me and my family. I spoke to your member down the street the other day and we chatted for a while, I thanked them for what they had done to help me, they told me that it wasn't much and that was what you are there for. When I came home I thought about what he had said and I thought that I should tell you what my life was like before you helped me. 3-

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Because of my disability | wasn't able to rear my children the way | would have liked and the way I planned when me and my husband were married. They were suffering with school because | was in so much pain that I couldn't stay awake to help them with homework and I know they didn't have everything they needed at school, I made them different. I still remember the day that I called you all those years ago when my daughter had come home from school crying because some of the girls were making fun of her uniform because it had some small holes in it, I felt so low, I felt ashamed that I had not been able to afford a new jumper and was too sick to sew her clothes. The tears in her eyes caused me to burst into tears, | was totally lost.

I knew that you helped people but because my husband was working I didn't want to ask you for help, especially as everyone knew he drank heavily. But I couldn't see my wee girl cry again. When I phoned you for the first time, all I could say was my name before I started to cry, I just couldn't talk, I hung up the phone and just cried for the next half hour, up until I heard the door knock. When I answered it there you were, I was so embarrassed, I didn't ever have visitors to my house, the room was a mess and the five children with clothes and toys all over the seats, I started to apologise for the mess but before I could finish the lady remarked how beautiful the curtains were, I appreciated that so much, you ignored the mess and lifted my spirits instantly.

The elderly member started talking to my kids and it gave me time to explain my problems to the lady, I said how I hated asking because my husband worked but drank his money, but I loved him. The lady just told me not to worry about that, we have all things that we have no control over. That night you left me and arrived back a short time later with food and arranged to get all my children the uniform items they needed including coats which only one of them had.

You know all that you have done for me since that day, the food, heat, toys, help with college. I'm so happy that my children have all left school with good educations, all of them working now.

Two things that none of you know but I want to tell you now because of what your member said "it wasn't much". Your member was doing what you have always done, making me feel good and playing down your work but you all need to know.

The first thing I want you to all know is that on the night I hung up the phone I had decided to put my

children to bed and swallow all my pills certainly enough to ensure I never woke up. I felt my children would be better with someone else and that my life wasn't worth living because I had done such a bad job looking after them. Your knock on my door stopped that.

The second thing I want to say is that when my daughter was getting married and I was hugging her before her wedding she told me she loved me and that she was so proud of me. We talked for a wee while and I told her I had been terrible as a mum, I talked about some of the real bad times but she told me I was being silly, she told me she was so proud of me because of the way I had done all I could for her and the rest of them.

She said she only remembered the good times like when we went to beach and outside swimming pool for a holiday, that was one of the times that you paid for us to go to Newcastle.

So, the second thing you gave me was to be able to let me see my daughter getting married and hearing that she was proud of me. Your knock on the door did that.

I will never forget all the kindness that you have always shown me, you are all my special friends, I say a prayer for you all every night, I love you all from the bottom of my heart. God bless you all.

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Our Vincent's charity shops are a very important aspect of the service SVP provides.

They provide customers with clothing and day-to-day goods at affordable prices, promote a friendly and respectful approach to all customers, a signposting service to help available for those in need and generate an income source for the Society. We are at the forefront of the reuse and recycling of clothing and goods.

The Northern Regional Retail Committee is established and authorised by the North Regional Council and Board of the Society. Our role is to advise, recommend and seek approval for matters relating to the retail operations of SVP and to ensure that the Society's retail activities, to include Shops, Order Fulfilment Centres and Transport, are appropriately managed through adequate oversight.

Retail structures under the remit of the Regional Committee include Regional Retail Units, Local Conference Retail Committees, Area Retail Units, Clusters of Retail Units and all Order Fulfilment Centres and Transport.

Retail

The Committee will provide expertise and have a review, evaluation and oversight role on all matters relating to retail operations of SVP within the North, [as contained in the most recent National Retail Strategy approved by National Management Council on 24 April 2021].

The Committee advises the Regional Council/ Board in relation to implementation, progress, and adherence with the National Retail Strategy 2021-2025.

In July 2022 a new Committee was formed, composed of Conference members of the Society. I was appointed Northern Retail Representative by Mary Waide, SVP Regional President for the North Region. The members of the Committee are Anne Marie Hughes [Secretary] and Mairead Taggart, Omagh; Eugene Graffin, Cushendall; Dominic Burke, Derry; and Sarah Watkiss, North Belfast. The Committee is supported by the Regional President, Regional Treasurer and Accountant and the Regional HR. The Regional Retail Manager reports to, advises and works closely with, the Retail Committee.

Our current priorities are to support all shops in being the best they can be, establish RACI in the North Region, ensure access to vans and van drivers where needed and establish ethical recycling throughout all our shops.

2022 was an extremely busy year for the shops in North Region. Sales alone amounted to £1.96 million and with recycling income added to this, it will pass £2 million.

Lucy's story as told at the Annual National Retail Conference

"From what we earn we can make a living: from what we give however makes a life"

When I started with Vincent's 8 years ago, I had no idea of the direction it would take me. I was unemployed due to my illness, I felt isolated, and my self esteem had hit an all time low, for the first time in my life, I was lost. I was brought up to always work hard so I always put huge pressure on myself. Trying to prove that every hour of every day I was worthwhile and good at my job. I did this while always feeling worried that my boss and my colleagues would see the real me, lacking in confidence. I felt I could never relax at work; I was always on high alert and eventually I reached a complete burnout after 25 years of this.

So, I, my body, and my mind, were all telling me enough was enough. I was forced to re-evaluate my life. My support worker suggested volunteering, and after a few suggestions I decided to volunteer at Vincent's. I always loved going to charity shops, on the lookout for unique clothes, jewellery etc. My dad was also called Vincent and, because I was aware of the great work Vincent's do for the local community, I decided to give them a go.

On my first day, I was so nervous. However, the manager was so lovely and easy to talk to and I began to feel at ease. I looked forward to learning new skills and offering my own skills. I loved socialising with customers and helping them, I began to feel alive again.



My confidence within myself grew and grew, there was no pressure and therefore I didn't put any pressure on myself.

I could work as little or as many hours as I wanted and depending on how I felt on any given day. My manager valued me and my new ideas I had for the shop. She said I had a "good eye" for things and I felt great about doing something good and giving back to society.

I took it one day at a time, and here we are 8 years later!

I have been asked many times, "how can you work without pay?". Don't get me wrong, it is hard being on benefits and I do struggle sometimes but now I put my health first and value myself a lot more and I realise material things can't compensate for bad health.

Volunteering has enriched my life so much; top of the list is being able to be myself. I have met great friends and we are all equal, we support each other through good times and bad. I have been there through three shop moves and we are all a great team. Our manager Alanna always says, "There is no 'I' in team". She is so positive, friendly, and enthusiastic, and it rubs off on all of us.

I can truly say I love working at Vincent's and long may that continue. It has shown me how to declutter my life and of course my wardrobe, of which 95% is from Vincent's!

We have so many laughs at work too, for example, I modelled at one of our fashion shows, I was doing great until I fell on the catwalk, I was dancing and trying to get the crowd going. I never got up as quick in all my life and then I just kept going. Everyone clapped and I saw the funny side of it, our fashion show was a great success!

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the entire team in Magherafelt for their unwavering support to me over the years, and of course, Anne Crossan, our Regional Retail Manager, for her hard work and dedication.

Now, lastly, I started with a quote and I would like to end with one:

"Use your voice for kindness, your ears for compassion, your mind for truth and your heart for love"

Visitation Handbook Launched in August 2022

A newly updated Handbook was issued to all members to set out member roles, best practice and guidance for visitation. In the spirit of Vincentian fraternity, it shares experiences from SVP Conferences and makes clear our responsibilities as members assisting and supporting people in Ireland.

The contents show the diverse nature of visitation work and our responsibility to seek guidance when we need it. Demonstrating our commitment to best practice, the handbook was designed to offer appropriate support when the need arises.

Circulated at a time when many individuals and families are facing great hardship, emerging from two years of Covid lockdowns, inflation, housing crisis and overwhelming pressure on public health services, the need for SVP support couldn't be greater.

Reaching out to people in need SVP members make a difference to the people we assist. The cornerstones of quality visitation present many challenges. Conducting home visits in line with best practice ensures confidentiality, promotes dignity and focuses on building self-sufficiency.

SVP Quality Visitation and Assessment of Need

Introduction

How we make a difference to the people we assist is the core work of SVP. The cornerstones of quality visitation present many different challenges for this work. At the SVP National Council meeting in May 2015, the following areas were identified as most important to the work of Visitation Conferences:

Quality Visitation

- Assessing the need of the people we visit more effectively
- The importance of having a nonjudgemental attitude
- The importance of actively listening during the visit
- The need to give time to the family and to express empathy
- The need to have an external knowledge of services
- The importance of having different skills within the membership of the Conference
- The effective pairing of members is necessary to ensure quality visitation
- The need to refer some people we assist on to other support services is crucial in helping to end dependency
- The need for quality case management to track the type of interventions clients receive to ensure consistency is equally important in visitation work
- Understanding the importance for people in need but also the limits of confidentiality.

Conducting Home Visitation



Prior to the Visit

- Prepare as much as possible using the SVP Assessment of Need form
- Give notice of your intention to visit (where practical)
- Conduct visit at an appropriate time
- Have the authority of the Conference to visit (no solo runs)
- Visits should be conducted in the home except in exceptional circumstances where visits may take place in a neutral public venue with some privacy
- Clinics are not an appropriate venue for visits.

Spotlight On SVP Member Dominic Burke



I joined SVP in 1964, the Blessed Virgin Conference in Ballymena. Pat McHugh was a younger member and asked me to come to the Sunday meeting. At that meeting I met the other members and was given the Blue Manual and was told by the Secretary I would be asked questions on "The Rule" in a month's time.

After 4 weeks I approached the Secretary and asked when he would be asking the questions. He started laughing and said "I was only joking". It meant that I had learnt "The Rule" and read the early writings of Society's Members. Today I am a member of St Eugene's Conference in Derry and Area Vice-President.

Membership of the Society has been very important to me. After joining I had the opportunity to become a member of the National Youth Committee of Ireland and attended International meetings in Ireland in 1965, Assisi 1967 and Lisbon 1969. I chaired the Down & Connor Youth Committee and was a member of that Diocesan Council.

Being a member enables me, with my fellow members, to meet the needs of people in our Parish.

The most significant change in the Society in my time has been women joining. This has brought a greater understanding of the pressures that families experience.

I also believe we are now a more professional voluntary organisation with training and development opportunities, which include online modules and face to face training, for new and existing members. The Society continues to be very relevant today. All the Conferences in the Derry Area Council are experiencing increasing demands for electricity, gas and food. We also receive many requests for furniture, clothing and household goods, which can be met in our local Vincent's Shop. The demands are only likely to increase in the current economic environment.

There have been many highlights during my time as a member, attending meetings both Regional and National has enabled me to meet members and learn more about the Vincentian family. Some 30 years ago I had the opportunity with Dr Kevin McCoy to visit Ghana, one of our twinned countries and see there the impact that twinning was having in and around Accra. It was certainly a great experience.

In order for the Society to remain relevant I believe it is necessary for the Society to have effective communication between Conferences and at all levels. So that we are planning and preparing to meet the changing needs.

SVP Safeguarding in Home Visitation - North Region

SVP is committed to creating a safe, healthy and inclusive environment for everyone, particularly the children, young people and adults at risk/in need of protection we assist.

SVP home visitation members have a vital role in helping vulnerable groups in the community.

What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding is preventative action to ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and adults at risk/ adults in need of protection. Safeguarding is an essential part of quality home visitation. It also provides information in case an SVP Member comes across a concern.



WHO IS A CHILD? A child is any person under the age of 18.

WHO IS AN ADULT AT RISK? In Northern Ireland an 'adult at risk of harm' is a person aged 18 or over whose exposure to harm through abuse, exploitation or neglect may be increased by their (a) personal circumstances, and/or (b) life circumstances.

WHO IS AN ADULT IN NEED OF PROTECTION? An 'adult in need of protection' is a person aged 18 or over whose exposure to harm through abuse, exploitation or neglect may be increased by their (a) personal circumstances, and/or (b) life circumstances, and (c) who is unable to protect their own wellbeing, property, assets, rights or other interests.

What is abuse?

ABUSE is a single or repeated act, or lack of appropriate action, occurring within any relationship where there is an expectation of trust, which causes harm or distress to another individual or violates their human or civil rights.

What can SVP members do if they have concerns about abuse?

Emotional

IT IS IMPORTANT that everyone in SVP is aware that the person who first encounters a case of alleged abuse is not responsible for deciding whether or not actual abuse has occurred.



Exploitation

SVP's role is not to investigate or form our own conclusions but to follow the SVP Safeguarding Policy – record, report and seek advice.





Concerns may arise from

Action

A disclosure of Α harm or abuse. An observed incident of harm or abuse.

A suspicion of harm or abuse.

Ensure the safety of the child/adult that you have a concern about.

If the person is in immediate danger report to the Health Trust or Police as appropriate.

B

Record your concern in writing and **report** to the Designated Liaison Person without delay.

Maintain confidentiality at all times.

Social Justice -A Key Cornerstone Of Our Work

The Society is committed to identifying the root cause of poverty and social exclusion, and, in solidarity with people experiencing poverty and disadvantage, we advocate and work for the chances required to create a more just and caring society for everyone.

With this aim in focus, members of the Region's Social Justice Group, proactively engaged with elected representatives from all political parties to highlight the impact of the cost of living crisis.

Concerned with the issues affecting those who have found themselves in poverty during the cost of living crisis, we asked for a collective coming together of parties in both parliaments to ensure people are supported to survive in this time of unprecedented hardship. We campaign for a willingness to work together to deliver the Anti-Poverty Strategy which was agreed for Northern Ireland.

Key issues we raised included:

- Provision of assistance for phone contracts/ internet for people on benefits who have to use their smartphone to access their benefits or information about their claim.
- People who require short term financial support for living expenses being offered the opportunity of availing of a discretionary grant in preference of being offered a loan.
- A reduction in the five-week wait for the Universal Credit assessment to be completed. Currently it results in people having to take

an advanced payment, and repayments leave people with a reduced rate of benefit, unnecessarily repaying debt to Government which pushes people deeper into poverty.

- A reintroduction of the £20 uplift to those on Universal Credit which was provided during lockdown. In our experience, this uplift brought people up to the position of "just managing". Reintroducing it would help those barely coping due to the rising costs of electricity and heating.
- Holiday hunger futureproofing assurance that children living in poverty will not go hungry during school holidays by guaranteeing provision and funding for school meals throughout all holiday periods.
- Remove the two child limit for Universal Credit and Child Tax Credits. This policy results in increased hardship for families and removing it would protect children from poverty.
- Increase housing benefit allowances so that tenants in the private rented sector do not have to supplement their payments as properties available have higher rents than their entitlements. This leads to poverty among tenants in the sector who have to make compromises in other areas to meet their rent payments.

It is unfortunate that the absence of political will makes it difficult for progress. We will continue to meet with any elected representative to be the voice of those that we support on a daily basis and to raise awareness through the media to highlight all issues as part of our commitment to a fair and equal society for all.

Spotlight On SVP Social Justice Group Chair, **Gerardine Cunningham**

I joined SVP in 2016. Having worked in Social Services all my working life, when I retired I asked myself the question – "what now?"

I had been reading a book called "Subversive Jesus" which spoke about how God turns the social order upside-down; where the poor are at the top of His agenda and I saw this as a challenge to me personally to engage with this way of thinking. SVP offered me the opportunity to turn this from a philosophical way of thinking to a way of living life, for which I will be eternally grateful.

The issue of justice has always been important to me, coming from a working class background and having seen the injustice of unemployment, lack of money, poor housing and insufficient housing in the community in which I lived. I was fortunate to have had good opportunities in terms of education and was fortunate to go to a good school and then to university in the days when Government saw education as an investment in the future generation, so I received a grant all the way through and, unlike young people today, was able to leave university without a debt to Government.

Today, I feel strongly that people are being treated punitively for being poor. The Universal Credit system deprives single people, single parents and families, of money on which to survive while they are "waiting for a decision" regarding benefits. They are forced to survive on nothing in this period, leading them to take a loan which is euphemistically called an "advance" which then launches them into debt to the Government. The system also pays them an insufficient amount of

benefit on which to survive. I have also been incensed by the system for PIP assessments, where people who are clearly ill are turned down and made to jump over endless hurdles until they give up or die. This cannot be the mark of a just society and I see the Social Justice Group as a way of channeling energy to see change happen.

As Chair of the Social Justice Group, I would like to see the Group as SVP's vehicle for holding Government to account and educating society about the reality rather than the myth about poverty. The Covid pandemic has shown us that none of us who now experience comfortable lives are immune from falling into poverty. We have seen people who had comfortable lives before the pandemic losing their businesses and losing their jobs. Poverty should be everybody's business.

The Social Justice Group is working to achieve better connections with Government. Striving to gather robust information from the CRM system to present a case for change.

We want to see SVP as an active agent of societal change with respect to poverty.

Maria took a very active part in the life of the Conference, serving terms both as President and Secretary. For many years, she took on much of the organisation of the annual Christmas Dinner and the Summer Outing.

As a Conference member, Maria visited referrals at home – often several during the course of a week – and frequently spent Sunday afternoons visiting the elderly in local nursing homes. When our Conference members started to visit prisoners in Hydebank

Women's Prison, Maria took on that role too and spent many Saturday mornings in the prison.

Maria was kind and compassionate to people who needed our help. She was straightforward and candid and people knew exactly where they stood with her. She took time to sit down and talk to people, seeking to understand their difficulties and suggesting ideas to try to make their lives better. She was never afraid to ask difficult questions to gain a better understanding of their situation. Maria had a particular interest in the young people she visited, many of whom had grown up in difficult circumstances. She often provided guidance and some straight talking to help them navigate their way.

During Conference discussions, Maria put forward her opinions robustly. She consistently spoke up on behalf of the lonely. Maria frequently reminded members that they had a Vincentian obligation to seek out and help the lonely. During quiet weeks when there were few referrals, she would urge members not to forget those living alone, and she never did, often dropping by for half an hour.

In addition to her work in the Society, Maria was an active member of several Parish organisations and was a regular reader in the church. Before she retired, she had been a primary school teacher in West Belfast and a teachers' union organiser.

Maria Graham was a small, slightly built woman whose appearance belied her inner energy, strength and sheer determination to improve peoples' lives for the better. She devoted a huge amount of her time to the work of the Society in our Parish and she will be greatly missed.
